

TAD Legislation Clears Committee

The Legislative Council Study Committee on Problem-Solving Courts has concluded its work on several legislative bill drafts. The drafts make some significant changes to the Treatment, Alternatives and Diversion grant program, as well as formally creating the statewide Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, and also recommend treatment courts for juveniles and families in crisis.

The full Legislative Council, which is headed by legislative leaders from both houses, must still approve the proposed legislation before the drafts are introduced to the Legislature as actual bills. The Legislative Council will likely meet to review the drafts from this and other study committees later this year.

The first draft, **WLC: 0028/2**, makes the following changes to current law:

- Permanently establishes the statewide Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. Gov. Scott Walker established the current Criminal Justice Coordinating Council by executive order in 2011, but the council would cease to exist once the governor's term ends.
- Establishes the statewide CJCC as an advisor to the Department of Justice in operating the TAD program.
- Allows counties and tribes to jointly operate a TAD project. Under current law, a county or a tribe may operate the program, but may not do so jointly.
- Allows TAD projects to operate in a continuum from arrest to discharge from supervision, effectively allowing for funding for programs diverting offenders at the time of arrest through alternatives to revocation.
- Allows TAD grants to fund projects that do not focus solely on alcohol or other drug abuse treatment.
- Requires TAD-funded projects to be evidence-based and designed to promote effective criminal justice policies to reduce prosecution and incarceration costs, reduce recidivism, and enhance justice and public safety.
- Requires TAD projects to be designed to integrate and coordinate services from several providers, including a participant's behavioral health treatment providers, case managers, and compliance monitors.
- Requires TAD projects to use evidence-based eligibility criteria to determine who may participate and to tailor its services to the needs of each participant or target population. The draft allows, but does not require, an eligible project to require participants to pay an amount toward their treatment.
- Eliminates the 25 percent matching fund requirement for project participation.
- Eliminates the current blanket prohibition on allowing individuals with violent offenses to participate in projects. Requires that a project must specify whether or not certain violent offenders will be allowed to participate. If so, there must be a victim advocate on the project's oversight committee, if such an advocate exists in the project county. If the project includes domestic abuse offenders, the oversight committee must consult with a batterers' treatment provider.

- Requires each county or tribe to submit data monthly as requested by the Department of Justice in order to allow DOJ to evaluate the project. Requires DOJ to prepare and submit an annual report to the TAD council and the public. Requires DOJ to prepare a comprehensive report every five years for submission to the Legislature and the public.
- Increases an appropriation to the Supreme Court to fund a statewide treatment court coordinator in the office of Director of State Courts.

The second draft, **WLC 0032/1**, creates a family treatment court grant program under the Children's Code, to be administered by the Department of Children and Families, and operating within the Children's Court. The bill also creates a similar program under the Juvenile Justice Code for juvenile courts.

The new Children's Court program:

- Provides grants to counties for treatment court programs.
- Requires projects to screen, assess, and give new dispositional alternatives for parents whose children have come under the jurisdiction of children's court, if those parents have problems related to mental illness or substance abuse.
- Requires qualifying projects to establish eligibility criteria for participation, provide evidence-based treatment services, and integrate all services provided to program participants by various governmental and non-governmental entities.

The Juvenile Court program operates in a similar fashion.

Funding for this program is within the limits of available funding from the appropriation that is used to fund both the family alcohol and other drug abuse pilot program under Wis. Stat. 48.547, and the juvenile alcohol and other drug abuse pilot program under Wis. Stats. 938.547.

Finally, the third draft, **WLC 0045/1**, allows an exception to the current 45 day minimum waiting period for eligibility for an occupational driver's license for persons who have had two or more prior operating while intoxicated provisions. The exception applies to individuals who are taking part in a TAD project once they have completed a court-ordered assessment and are complying with a court-ordered safety plan.

Legislative Council study committees focus on issues of statewide importance that are typically too complex to address during the regular legislative session. The study committees are made up of both legislators and citizen members who have expertise in the area being studied.
