1. Call to order/roll call.

Robert Majewski called meeting to order at 8:02 a.m.

2. School District Representative.

County Administrator John Lefebvre made recommendation to County Board on August 28, 2018 to appoint Matt Hanson as School District Representative to the Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee, unlimited term.

Jail population report presented. Bob Majewski commented that high inmate population continuing. Due to age of facility, scheduling maintenance is an ongoing challenge and difficult to schedule with high population numbers. Discussion continuing with Failure to Pay warrants.

9. TAD/Drug Court update.

There are currently 16 participants in the TAD/Drug Court program. 2019 TAD/Drug Court Grant has been submitted. To date: 52 total participants/19 terminations/17 graduates.

10. Mental Health Court update.

The first court session was held for Mental Health with two participants and two referrals.

11. P&P Day Reporting Center update.

Programs at P&P Day Reporting Center are going well with the following participation:

Marinette County Jail Program Notes

1. Education Update:

- Three inmates are currently enrolled in our NWTC/GED Program. Year to date we have had 60 passed tested and 10 General Education Diplomas completed. The next GED testing session is scheduled for Tuesday, October, 23rd. Since the inception of the Marinette County Adult Education Program we have had 197 completed General Education Diplomas.
- We currently have one high school age students incarcerated at this time. Since the individual is sentenced and eligible for work release he has been released on regularly scheduled days to attend his classes on site, at Marinette High School.

2. Programs Update:

- a. The next Marinette County OWI Victim Impact Panel is scheduled for Thursday, November 1st. Mike Knetzger of the Green Bay Police Department will be our speaker.
- b. We currently have 2 inmates in our community service program. On October 10th Sgt. Moser attended the annual Jail Administrators conference and spoke to various representatives of other sheriff's offices about the Marinette County Jail Community Service Program. Other counties represented were Dane, Rock, and Fond du Lac who spoke on how they facilitate community service within their respective agencies.
- c. In July we completed a cycle of our Male Anger Management Program with 7 inmates attending all sessions and receiving certificates of completion. We currently have a female cycle in progress with 4 participants.
- d. On August 30th, we completed a cycle of our AODA program, facilitated by Off the Couch Wellness, with 6 males receiving certificates of completion. We have a female cycle scheduled to begin this month.
- e. On August 15th, a cycle of our male domestic violence program facilitated by Off the Couch Wellness, was completed with 9 inmates receiving certificates of completion. Another cycle is currently in progress with 8 participants
- f. On September 5th, a cycle of our female self-esteem program was completed, facilitated by jail volunteer Gail Wanek, with 5 individuals receiving certificates of completion.
- g. On September 13th, a cycle of our male cognitive thinking program was completed, facilitated by the Marinette Menominee Jail Outreach group, with 10 individuals receiving certificates of completion.
- h. The Wisconsin Childcare and Family Resources of N.E.W. is currently facilitating a Triple P seminar (Positive, Parenting, Program) for both male and female individuals on separate days. There are currently 9 female and 10 male participants.

- i. We have continued to run our weekly resume building workshops, facilitated by the Job Center of Wisconsin. In these workshops inmates work one-on-one to update existing resumes and creating new ones to assist in obtaining employment post release, or obtaining employment while incarcerated and utilizing their work release privileges. To my knowledge 8 individuals have begun working with local employers as a direct result from the program along with countless others receiving interview requests post incarceration.
