Discussion held on subjects suffering from mental illness, not just in the jail, but in the Criminal Justice System. County Administrator Shawn Hennessee, Judge Morrison, Robin Elsner and Rob Valentine recently visited Brown and Outagamie Counties mental health court systems. There was agreement that mental health issues need to be addressed and a work group needs to be organized to discuss implementing structure, criteria, and funding of a mental health court in Marinette County. Currently there are only four counties in the State who participate in mental

## **CJCC Meeting Jail Program Notes**

**May 6, 2016**

**Marinette County Sheriff's Office**

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- Two high school students are incarcerated and receiving services from Marinette High School. One student is on pace to graduate in May.
- Six inmates are currently enrolled in the GED program. There have been eighteen passed GED tests this year, including three GED completions.
- The first Anger Management class of the year started on April 27<sup>th</sup>. There is a new curriculum being taught, called "Houses of Healing." Seven male inmates are enrolled in the six session program.
- Five week female self-esteem concluded on March 7<sup>th</sup>, with seven completions.
- A male stinking thinking program concluded on April 28<sup>th</sup> with eight completions. Year to date, sixteen male inmates have completed the course.
- A female stinking thinking program also concluded on April 25<sup>th</sup> with five completions. Currently, nine female inmates have completed the course.
- Family reunification program started on April 1<sup>st</sup> with seven female participants. The program is scheduled to be completed today, May 6<sup>th</sup>.
- A male parenting program will begin on May 17<sup>th</sup> with 12 participants.
- The Marinette County OWI Victim Impact Panel took place on February 4, 2015. Twenty one OWI offenders were in attendance. On May 5, 2016 the second panel of the year took place with thirty OWI offenders ordered to attend.
- Six huber eligible inmates weren't employed prior to their incarceration. Due to the job center workshop, these inmates found employment and are now working huber inmates. In addition, two of these inmates also have active child support cases and are now able to satisfy their payments.
