5. Justice System information sharing.

Joe Moser presented Jail Program notes. The next Victim Impact Panel will be held Thursday, August 5th. Bob Majewski commented because of wage study restructuring, Tom Bourque is the new Assistant Jail Administrator and Joe Moser's new title is Sergeant. Sheriff Sauve, Bob Majewski and Tom Bourque attended the Inmate Healthcare seminar in Waupaca yesterday. Sheriff Sauve stated he has received various comments and concerns regarding sex offender's notifications and process being followed to inform public and keeping the peace for everyone. (Attachment)

6. Jail inmates suffering from mental illness/work group update.

Judge Morrison commented the DA's Office needs staffing to make the Jail mental illness program work in Marinette County. Bob Majewski updated committee on mental illness work group meeting.

8. Jail population update.

Jail population report presented. Jail inspection scheduled for next week. DA Morrow commented she had discussions with Jail Administrator Majewski that with two Assistant DA's there could possibly be a rise in inmate population but presentencing would go quicker.

9. TAD/Drug Court update.

Sarah Plansky-Pecor stated there have been a total of 36 participants in the TAD/Drug Court program; currently 16 participants; 9 graduates. The Alumni Program meets once a month and is involved in speaking engagements and will present a booth at National Night Out in August.

10. P&P Day Reporting Center update.

11. Hiring Assistant District Attorney.

DA Morrow stated Cody Marschall is the new Assistant DA and will begin on Monday, July 24th. DA Morrow has requested funding from the County for a second fulltime position. The County is currently in process of considering the request. John Lefebvre stated that the funding for a fulltime ADA position was supported by Personnel Committee and forwarded to the County Board for approval. The Finance Committee discussed the request but took no action and a meeting has been scheduled for the Law Enforcement Committee to consider the request at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday, July 25th prior to the County Board meeting. In addition, a meeting with the County's State Representatives regarding the State funding a second fulltime Assistant DA position is in the process of being scheduled. County Administrator has authority to include position in 2018 budget but would like to extend into 2019 budget also. Some counties in Wisconsin fund DA positions.

CJCC Meeting Jail Program Notes
July 21st, 2017

1. Two Inmates are currently enrolled in our GED Program. Year to date we have had 13 passed GED Tests. Since the inception the program we have had 181 completed GEDs through the GED Program.
2. High School- Is out for summer but we Officially had (2) High School Graduates (Reed, Monroe) We currently have 2 high school age student incarcerated
3. Programs Update:
 - a. A Female anger management class was completed in mid-June with 4 participant's receiving certificates of completion. We currently have a male class in session with 6 inmates on track to receive certificates. Year to date we have had 9 inmates successfully complete the program.
 - b. Female self-esteem was completed on May 23rd with 7 participants receiving certificates of completion. We currently have another class in session with 5 inmates on track to receive certificates of completion.
 - c. We have received approval to have a new volunteer begin facilitating a financial management class. John Trombley comes to us with over 20 years of teaching experience and has experience with Primerica financial services. We hope to have his first class begin next month.
 - d. Our Job Center workshops have been very successful so far this year with 6 inmates receiving full-time employment as a direct result of the workshops. We have also been requiring inmates to attend Job Center/Child Support workshops as referred by child support.
 - e. We currently have a male cognitive thinking class in session with 11 participants. Year to date we have had 9 inmates receive certificates of completion.
 - f. We just completed our third AODA class of the year with 7 inmates receiving certificates of completion. Year to date we have had 17 inmates complete the program.
 - g. We have started a new program in our facility titled Hope for Wounded Hearts. This program is designed specifically for females who have been victimized in their past and are shown ways to overcome the stigma through faith based practices along

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with other methods. Prior to coming to our facility I was able to receive positive referrals from both Brown and Outagamie County Inmate Education Facilitators.

- h. We have also restarted our male domestic violence class through Catholic Charities. With the start of this class and with the impending start financial management class we will have all programs up and running along with one new program.
4. We have recently received a large donation of soft cover books from the Local St. Vincent De Paul Society of Marinette to revamp our library inventory. Over the past couple weeks we have gathered our over-used and damaged books and now have replacements thanks to their generous donation.
5. The next Victim Impact Panel will be held on Thursday August 5th. We will have a 2 new speakers Mr. Mike Knetzger and Anna Nowak.
6. We currently have 2 community service inmates working at Badger and 1 inmate working with the Marinette County Maintenance Dept. One of our Badger Park community service inmates with a background in masonry work has been assisting in constructing a new group fire pit area within the campgrounds of the park. We have prepped and been approved to begin our inmate work van trash pick-up program. However, due the abundance of rain I have found it difficult to coordinate a date and time to begin given the conditions.
7. Future considerations

Windows to Work program- We are hopeful to have the opportunity to work once again with Bay Area Workforce Development shortly. This program could provide designed to assist incarcerated individuals make a successful transition back into the community. The program's case managers serve as the client's advocate, working with corrections personnel (myself) to help participants get on track ~~and start~~ with a new life.

Opiate overdose prevention- I have spoken with a member of the Aids Resource Center of Wisconsin about an Opiate Overdose prevention program. This program is a no-cost training being offered by the group to Sherriff's Offices throughout the state that teaches Correctional Staff how to properly identify opiates and how to administer the lifesaving antidote naloxone also known as NARCAN if they suffer from accidental exposure. Especially with the rapid rise in accidental fentanyl exposures to officers recently throughout the country, I believe this could be a very useful training opportunity to our staff.
